### ■ *CCS Visiting Scholars in 2006*

The Center for Chinese Studies finalized its list of visiting scholar research grant recipients for 2006. A total of 52 grant applications was assessed by a selection committee that convened on August 6, chaired by NCL Director Juang Fang-rung and joined by six experts.
