■ 2005 ISBN/CIP Application Statistics for Taiwan

A survey conducted by the Cabinet-level Government Information Office found that Taiwan's publishing industry had a total output value of about NT\$22 billion in 2004, a sharp decline from the NT\$40-plus billion registered two years before. It is likely that the 2005 figure will fall even lower as the publishing industry feels the pinch from natural disasters and soaring oil prices. Nevertheless, with the rise of closer cross-strait cooperation and specialization, along domestic publishers have been drawing on their strengths in marketing and business planning to develop sales channels in the mainland market, hoping thereby to tap new growth opportunities.

One window on the state of the publishing industry in Taiwan is the NCL's New Books: Recent and Forthcoming Publications in Taiwan, ROC, which provides statistics on ISBN and CIP applications in 2005, as summarized in the chart below. (Chinese text excerpted from article by Wang Hsuan)
